| | Farm Fund Secured Loans | Applicants may apply for a minimum of \$500 up to \$12,000, secured at a 3% interest rate. Funds may be used to purchase machinery, equipment, farm supplies, labor or other resources necessary for increasing productivity or on- farm construction. | Farmers in Whatcom or Skagit counties working to stabilize or expand their farming or food processing operation to increase the amount of locally, organically and sustainably produced products. | |
| | Next Step Grants | The project pairs grant funding with loans or other investments. Grant-to-loan ratio is 1-4. A minimum grant amount of \$1250 corresponds to a \$5000 loan. The Maximum grant amount is \$5000 corresponding to a loan of \$20,000.
